The Norwegian saxophonist Ola Asdahl Rokkones (born in 1983) appears as the master builder of these recordings, perfectly successful on the technical level and exciting in more than one respect with regard to aesthetics. Active both in the classical and jazz fields, he defends with skill three scores in first world engraving. Its rigorous and flexible playing, its warm and lascivious timbres, its controlled and catchy rhythms are perfectly combined with the fine sound qualities of the Saint-Petersburg Northern Sinfonia Orchestra
